ACCELERATED LEARNING PROGRAM

The Accelerated Learning Program is for Grade 6 students who are looking for extra challenges in Years 7-9 and who are motivated and engaged learners who wish to be part of a program for like-minded students.

Acceleration means progressing through curriculum and learning faster, having more challenging opportunities and more emphasis on leadership and higher order thinking skills. Students in the ALP will accelerate in English, Science, Maths and Humanities from Year 7-9 together as a class. There will be less repetition of content, opportunities for acceleration into the Senior Years, a wide range of extracurricular extension opportunities. And a focus on deep learning and academic enrichment.

From Year 10 students will continue to be able to accelerate as part of our wider acceleration program across all subjects and open to all students. Students will be able to take part in debating, Model United Nations, the entirely student run newspaper, World Scholars Cup, our peripatetic music tuition program, bands, our orchestra, the school production, a myriad of sporting teams and experiences, student leadership and opportunities, ICAS training assessment competitions, a wide range of lunchtime clubs, the Australian Mathematics Competition, The University of Melbourne Micro-Mathematicians Incursion and Maths Competition, Maths Games Day (Victorian Challenge and Enrichment) and activities such as chess club, manga anime club and more.

Students are expected to be self-motivated and independent learners. Two key parts of the program are increased workload and faster curriculum coverage The program is suited to students who are engaged by academic challenge, enjoy problem solving, are mature and committed to their learning, are motivated to achieve excellence, enjoy working alongside likeminded peers, thrive in independent and collaborative learning

THE TROJAN WAR

The final instalment of the successful works from A Slightly Isolated Dog, *THE TROJAN WAR* is a raucous celebration of our ridiculous lives: combining theatrical magic, wicked pop songs and fierce wit to playfully explore questions around the current chaos of our times.

The students were fantastic on the day and spent time analysing and evaluating the performance upon returning to class in preparation for their assessment.

SENIOR GIRLS' FOOTBALL

25 Year 9 - 12 students competed in the senior girls football competition at Winters reserve. The girls came away with two wins, against Bellarine and Oberon, before falling just short in a semi final against Belmont.



MATHS

Year 7-10 students participated in the Victoria Rocks Timetables Competition. The students competed against other students, displaying their timetable knowledge. Overall, Geelong High School came 31st, with the students answering 47,147 questions. We came third out of the participating secondary schools.

World of Maths - Year 7 Incursion

Year 7 students participated in the World of Maths incursion. They worked in teams to solve a range of engaging problem solving tasks with a real life applications.

CHAMBER ORCHESTRA

The Orchestra has 30 students studying a huge program of pieces this year in readiness for their Spring Concert.

The program includes works from The Magic Flute by Mozart, Palladio by Karl Jenkins, Game of Thrones by Ramin Djawadi, Jupiter Rising by Gustav Holst, Seven Nation Army by White Stripes and Bitter Sweet Symphony by Mick Jagger and Keith Richards, just to name a few. It is a very exciting program but a very challenging one.



CAREERS

All Year 9 students participated in the Careers week which involved students completing TAFE modules, finishing their RESUME and Career Action Plan as well participating in practical activities. Each student has increased their knowledge on workplace communication and being safe in the workplace through OHS units. The student's enthusiasm and willingness to learn while on site at The Gordon was brilliant.







ATHLETICS

Two of our students competed at the recent National Athletics Championships in Adelaide. Angus Baker made the final for the 800m and came 7th. Leo Strzadala made the final for both the 200m and the 400m. He came 5th in the 400m and also ran a PB and then came 7th in the 200m.

End of Year PRANKS

End-of-year pranks by Year 12 students have become traditional in recent years, some more amusing than others! Many schools find themselves daubed in toilet paper, shaving cream, eggs, etc. Placing a Property for Sale ad in the Geelong Advertiser is a bit passé these days, but advertising the Year 12 Co-ordinator's car for sale is still good for a laugh.

One year, the group dressed in combat gear and raced around the school and Eastern Park making horrendous threats and taking hostages (all in good fun, of course). Unfortunately, some civic-minded outsiders didn't view these goings-on in quite the same light and called the police!

Then, there was the year of the chickens. Probably the less said about that the better.

It is unfortunate that Muck-up Day (as it's come to be called) has become quite a destructive event with damage to school and property not unusual. There have even been deaths of students when pranks have gone wrong (not at Geelong High School, I hasten to add—Ed.).

So, the end of October saw the adult portion of our school community somewhat anxious about what might be in store for us and it was at the Farewell Assembly for the Class of '99 that the unthinkable became reality — the Principal didn't have a lectern to lean on.

The Great Lectern Heist

Questions were asked, concern expressed. Where had our beloved and indispensable lectern gone? Had it been stolen? Was it merely misplaced?

We didn't have to wait long to learn the awful truth. During the assembly, a ransom note was received, the presentation of which showed, in graphic detail, the dire straits into which our lectern had fallen.

We have your lectern, the note read. We demand sympathy and smiles or the lectern gets it ...

This dreadful epistle was accompanied by photographic evidence that, if the demands were not met, we might never see Hannibal (as the lectern is affectionately known) again.

The shocked audience demanded that the ransom be paid immediately and the Principal promised to discuss the matter with his colleagues as a matter of urgency.

Later that day, a response was formulated and multiple copies were distributed at an event at which it was felt the perpetrators might be present (the 1999 Valedictory Dinner at Aberdeen Chateau).

Unfortunately, neither the big cheesy grin (the smile) or the sheepish look (the sympathy) depicted by Principal Brebner in his response was considered quite good enough and negotiations broke down until, at the end of the evening, a resolution was reached and it was agreed that a ransom of \$100 towards the cost of the Year 12 Formal would be paid — and, until that was done, Hannibal Lectern would not be returned to its rightful place on the stage at Geelong High School.

And so, we waited.

The suspense was really quite dreadful. After all, generations of students had been lectured or amused from, even sent to sleep in front of, the

Geelong High School lectern. Its absence was felt by all — but especially by those preparing for the allimportant end-ofyear Presentation Ceremony!

Then, a long two weeks later, a letter was received which, as well as reassuring us that all was well with our beloved piece of equipment, detailed its adventures since the dreadful kidnap ordeal took place

Hannibal had travelled all around Geelong, including a visit to Belmont High School; to London, Athens, Washington—and there were the photos to prove it.

It appeared, too, that a certain prominent member of staff (APB) had known about the kidnapping—and done nothing about it!

The Aftermath

The ransom was paid and, with a collective sigh of relief, the Geelong High School community welcomed back the lectern after its almost unbelievable ordeal.

However, we hope that our lectern's travels are over and it will have a long and happy career at Geelong High School, in the company of, and supporting, a variety of esteemed speakers.

This event triggered a search through previous *Flotsams* to find evidence of similar skullduggery, but I can only assume that, either previous editors have shown enormous reticence in this department, or past valedictory students of Geelong High Schools were models of decorum, because I could only find two such events (and they were not necessarily perpetrated by a valedictory class).

And this was followed by ...



When informed of these matters, the principal, Mr. C. A. Love, was amazed. 'I thought we'd completely gotten rid of chewing gum,' he said.




It was with some amusement that I read of the abduction of Hannibal Lectern last *Friends*. It brought to mind our previous year's (1998) prank which also involved a teacher who shall remain nameless. Obviously (Run a-)Muck up day had been planned from the outset of entering the school in 1993, and little planned was actually going to happen. Finally, in March, 1998, a group of us took the plunge, while in Aussie Disposals, of purchasing a skull and crossbones pirate flag for the sole purpose of running it up the main flagpole. Plans were made (which often were quite violent, like abducting the flag monitors, and taking the keys) and we were all set. Mr. Brebner had other ideas

Day before (Run a-)Muck up day, we were told that we were not allowed to perform ANY pranks whatsoever. We were devastated. but, of course, Geelong High students are resourceful, and Meg Sawyer obtained approval from the then Assistant Principal to run our flag up the pole Except ... we couldn't do it in the morning as the flag poles were locked for security reasons. So, this unnamed AP unlocked the poles at the close of the day, for us to return later that night and run the flag up then. So in the end Leighton Judd, Meg Sawyer, Kate Whitehand and myself returned later that night to raise the flag. We cammed (camouflaged) up, and headed out in Leighton's 1956 Morris (which sounded suitably like a tank - very military/ commando), parked in Normanby Street, and jumped the fence. A conscientious citizen tooted their horn as a deterrent at that stage, and Leighton and I tied the flag to the pole while Kate and Meg kept watch. Over in five minutes, we decided to do a commando run through the school, after which we found the unnamed AP locking the flag poles back up. So ended the prank ... or so we thought

After driving around town all day, tooting pedestrians and other Year 12 students, Leighton went back to claim the flag it couldn't be found. And so, dejected, we attended the Valedictory dinner that evening. Mr Brebner spoke eloquently as did the unnamed AP, who told an unrelated story of stationery. Seems the school had ordered hundreds of "Congratulations" cards which were to be photographs of the front of the school, and had agonised over the decision to spend a few thousand dollars obtaining these from a professional printer. Finally, the School Council acquiesced, and the photo was taken ... of the flagpoles, with our skull flag. The response from the student audience was predictable, and after the laughter died down, we got our flag back, which now resides in a place of honour at my house

[It was later that we told the students that the "stationery" hadn't actually been ordered, but was a fine product of the one and only editor of this publication, Jennifer Colquhoun].



Don't ever let your computer technician son loose in your computer until you have done a full backup.

It occurred to neither of us that there was any danger inherent in what he was planning to add to my hard drive.

But, my computer being fairly old and running on Windows 7, had different ideas. It crashed spectacularly and the move to Windows 10 (or more correctly, Windows 365) had to take place whether I liked it or not.

This, of course, meant I had to purchase new versions of Word, Publisher, Photoshop and an assortment of various programs which I randomly use (and probably never paid for in the first place, if I'm honest).

But that's not the worse thing. What's worst is that I've lost years of accumulated data—my address book, my favourite fonts, my colours, my brushes, my styles, my music. All gone. Thankfully, most of my data and client work was able to be salvaged. I only lost the most recent work.

I'm not comfortable with the new version of Publisher, the program I write this newsletter in. I'm slowly getting the hang it but it throws a curve ball every now and then and invariably I haven't got a clue how to overcome it. For example, the scanner wants to save photos in a new format and I haven't quite figured out how to save simply, as before, in .jpg.

But I truly loathe Photoshop 24. And given what it costs (an annual fee of about \$350), I'm appalled that it doesn't seem to come with all the bells and whistles my old version did. It sort of looks half finished. I used to be able to say, without hesitation, Yes, I can do that. Now, it takes two or three times as long to do it because I don't know where anything is or how anything works.

Then, of course, there's email. We had to dismantle that twice (and pay for the program twice). You possibly got an email notification from me but we had to change that one. Something went wrong with Outlook and even an hour on the phone with Microsoft couldn't fix the problem. No refund either.

In the midst of all this, my bank account was hacked. I've only lost \$3,000 instead of what the bank managed to recover. But still, it's horrible.
